Feeding and nurturing our faith, and the faith of our children, is important all year long. So, this summer I want to challenge all of you to look for ways that you can continue to

grow in your relationship with Jesus Christ, even as you travel, rest, and spend time at your happy place, wherever that might be! Below I have provided a list of possible suggestions to help you grow in faith even when you are physically absent from Christ Church.

Find a church at the beach- Worship is important. Most coastal churches are eager to welcome seasonal worshipers. Worship is not just about what we get out of it, but it is also about what we put in. God desires our worship. Corporate worship is an important part of our Christian identity.

Spend time in the Word- Take your Bible on vacation with you. If you are one of those early risers who likes to watch the sun rise over the water, there is no better time to read God's inspired word. The scriptures are powerful, and they can inspire you in ways you never imagined!

Embrace a daily devotion- As Episcopalians we are blessed with a wonderful resource in the Book of Common Prayer. In addition to Morning and Evening Prayer there are several other short prayer devotions that are geared toward individuals and families. They are found on page 137. Try incorporating one or more of these devotions into your daily agenda.

Attend a midweek service at Christ Church- If you find that you are out of town on the weekends, but in Elizabeth City during the week, try attending one of our mid-week services. Morning Prayer is offered daily at 7:00am in St. Philip's Chapel and Holy Eucharist is offered every Wednesday at noon.

Worship with us online- One of the benefits of the recent pandemic is that we now can offer our worship services online. Feel free to join us wherever you might be at 10:30am on Sunday mornings or catch up with the recording!

Let us remember the words of our Savior from Matthew 11:28-30 "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light." I pray that everyone has a safe, fun, and fulfilling summer and I look forward to hearing about how God was at work in your life while on vacation, allowing Christ to provide us with true rest!

LET'S TALK ABOUT THE HOLY TRINITY

150 years before Jesus was born, a man named Hipparchus said there were exactly 1026 stars in the universe. 1500 years later Galileo using a newly invented telescope, looked up into the sky and saw many times that number. Today we know there are about 100 billion stars in our galaxy alone, and, there are billions of galaxies such as

ours. Can you get your mind around that? Billions and billions of solar systems like our own! How big is this universe? Several years ago, an astronomer observed with his naked eye the explosion of a distant supernova - an explosion so powerful that it released as much energy in one second as our sun will release in ten billion years. The truly startling fact is that this supernova exploded 170,000 years before it was observed on earth. It took that long for the light generated by that far-away explosion, traveling almost 6 trillion miles a year, to reach us on planet earth. Can you imagine the magnitude of a God who is bigger than all that? Is your God big enough?

Can you imagine a God for whom time does not even exist? We talk about "forever is a long time." That's not it at all! Where God is, there is no time. In Augustine's writings, he said God created time just as He created space. There is no tomorrow or yesterday in heaven. It is always now! Can you get your mind around that? Eternity is timeless.

Having said all of that, realize that we are bearing witness that the God who is beyond our understanding, came to this planet earth in the person of Jesus of Nazareth. No question, some people have problems with this. But, this fact is the heart of the Christian message. We are not Deists, Jews nor Unitarians. We believe God came into the world in the life of a humble carpenter.

Notice, I did not say in the guise, or form, or pretext of a humble carpenter. I said in the life of a humble carpenter. Jesus was not masquerading as a man. No, God emptied Himself and became fully human when Christ was born in the manger of Bethlehem. He cried real tears, sweat real sweat and bled real blood. He was fully human, yet fully God. God was in Him "reconciling the world unto Himself."

It is beyond our comprehension that a God of billions of galaxies would humble Himself to become one of us, and take upon Himself our weaknesses, our shame, but you see, God is God. He defies all of the categories with which we are familiar. That is what the doctrine of the Trinity is saying to us. God is bigger than all that we know and all that we can imagine. Yet, God humbled Himself and walked among us.

Admittedly, the Trinity is a deep mystery. Theologians have spent lifetimes spraining their brains trying to understand it.

Well, it always helps to dig and to learn what the early church, the church formed by Jesus' followers meant when they spoke of "God in three persons." The word "person" comes from the Latin "persona," and originally referred to the mask worn on the stage by actors in a play. Because of masks, each actor in the Roman theater could play several roles. So God plays several different roles on the stage of human history. God is the Creator, God is Redeemer, God is Sustainer. You might look at it as God's attempt to get closer and closer to us. Not content to be "above" us, God came to walk beside us. Not even content with that, God now dwells - dwells within us. That is what we mean when we say, "I believe in the Holy Spirit." The Holy Spirit is God in the present tense. The Doctrine of the Trinity says basically that the essence of God is relational. God's very being, God's oneness, can only be described in terms that describe a relationship.

The confusing doctrine of the Trinity says that the same God of a billion galaxies is he who emptied Himself and walked the dusty roads of Galilee. He is also here, and He is available. If we have a need, He is our Provider. If we are broken-hearted, He is our encourager. If we have wandered from the path of righteousness, He is our Savior. Everything we ever need, we find in Him. God in three persons, blessed Trinity.

A Bishop's Meanderings...

Here is a word that can strike fear into our hearts. *Forgiveness*. In the Gospel of Matthew, Peter asks Jesus how often he should forgive. He should have known better because the answer was, "seventy times seventy." The human response will be, "Oh good! Then I can quit at 4901!" Well, no, of course Jesus meant there is no limit to forgiveness. We struggle with this all of the

time. It is a very personal and potentially painful subject. I think it may be the one thing that could actually heal our world, but it is so very, very hard to do as a way of life. C. S. Lewis once wrote that "everyone says that forgiveness is a lovely idea until they have something to forgive." "If you..... then I...." is usually the way forgiveness works in our world. When it appears at all, it is "othergenerated," If you change, if you are really sorry, if you promise to never do it again, if you make amends over the right amount of time, THEN, I might get around to forgiving you. Maybe..... There are no guarantees here. My self-respect, my offended pride, my value system demand no less. No cheap grace, no way, no how...... We tend to deal out forgiveness as if it were a commodity we own, and there is a limited supply of it. We cannot afford to just give it out to just anyone who might need it. Well, yes we can, but it requires humility, honesty, and compassion.

As we read about Jesus it is clear that true forgiveness is not "other-generated," but rather "God-generated." To forgive in the name of Jesus comes independent of the attitude of the offending other. That is why the capacity to forgive is a gift from God. Everything human in us recoils at such a thought. The "eye-for-an-eye" grip is simply too strong. Its entitlements are just too precious to give up easily. But, as is the case with every decision, there is a cost. Over time, the legitimate hurt and anger over being wronged begins to turn cold. The chill of resentment glazes over the human heart. What was meant to be a warm furnace of love becomes instead an icy deep-freeze of bitterness. An "arthritis of the spirit" sets in. Life shrinks, and life stinks. So, what is the payoff for unforgiveness? Why is it so popular? The payoff, of course, is that the offended party can stay offended, self-justified to the end. Unforgivers, blind to their own behavior, keep impeccable and detailed records on the specks in their neighbors' eyes. I think we can often distinguish those who forgive from those who refuse to forgive by the look in their eye. Is there gentleness and peace there, or does it seem a bit rigid and unwelcoming?

Several years ago we visited what may be the most powerful symbol of Jesus-forgiveness in the world in what is left of the high altar of the charred, skeletal remains of Coventry Cathedral in England, fire-bombed by the Nazis in WWII. On the altar is set a cross, an unadorned cross of nails, stark, simple, powerful. It somehow makes everyone looking at it to stop and be quiet. Underneath the cross are the words, "Father,

forgive." Not, "Father forgive those murderous Nazis," but simply, "Father, forgive." Forgive them. Forgive us. Forgive everyone. Forgive those of us who live our lives in-between good and evil. Forgive those who are offended by your total unmerited forgiveness of them. Forgive us all, and, in turn, let us all forgive those who have sinned against us. Can you imagine such a world?
